KBULG today is known as the Goldfields largest and most active Community **Environmental** Organisation, and we are proud and grateful to have become the principal environmental knowledge sharing hub of the Goldfields and driving

The environmental movement in Kalgoorlie-Boulder was firstly initiated by the Goldfields Dust Abatement Committee (GDAC) originally formed in 1973 in response to the severe dust storms which detrimentally affected the community and the Goldfields' environment.

Dust storms were reportedly so intense that residents were left having to shovel dust of their

The GDAC was successful in achieving the establishment of a 'green belt area' surrounding the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder by devising and fencing off an approximate 3,500 ha of native bushland into six recognized regeneration zones

GREENING THE GOLDFIELDS zones serve to block out the dust and remain largely intact to this day. Another environmental group, the Gibble Creek Management Committee, subsequently formed to oversee the health of our only creek system. In 1984 the GDAC and the Gibble

Creek Management Committee reformed into KBULG, with KBULG being incorporated as a Community Landcare Group in 1994.

KBULG today operates out of and manages Karlkurla Bushland Park, one of the original six regeneration zones devised by the GDAC.

Continuing on from the GDAC, a core mission of KBULG remains the conservation of intact bushland and the 're-greening' of urban spaces.

Due to widespread deforestation

activities from 1900-1965 the majority of existing vegetation surrounding our city comprises less than 100-year-old regrowth, and for intact ecosystems to flourish it is crucial to ensure its ongoing protection.

GETTING YOUR AUTUMN AND WINTER VEGETABLES TO GROW

The colder months provide some challenges for both amateur and professional gardeners. Cooler days, morning frost and reduced daylight make successfully growing vegetables indeed a little harder.

But don't be frightened - It is an excellent time of year to grow vegetable and herb seeds that love cooler conditions.

Some considerations to help your cold season planting success: **Sunlight and Frost**

Keep in mind the lower path of the sun across the winter sky and the reduced hours of daylight. This will result in an increased amount of shade, in particular in the vicinity of trees or high structures. Position your winter vegetable patch in your sunniest garden section and ensure that it is sheltered rom strong winds. Leafy greens and root vegetables generally perform well in partial shade and are a great option to plant in the cooler months. To protect your crop from rost you can use geo fabrics such as hessian as a shield. Some winter vegetables are known to tolerate a little frost and frost can even improve their taste as it triggers certain crops to produce more sugars. After a frost try harvesting hardy crops such as snow pea parsnip, carrots, broccoli and cauliflower.

Adequate Spacing In winter it is especially tempting to ow extra seeds in case not all germinate uccessfully. However, you might end up with a high germination rate, and therefor it is important to thin your seedlings to ensure adequate room to grow and to avoid overcrowding. Rather than sowing all your seeds in one go consider succession plantin around every two weeks to allow for a longer growing season with your vegetables

maturing at different times. **Moisture and Maintenance**

If possible, water your crop in the morning to allow any excess water to dry off and avoid crop being left damp overnight and more prone to diseases. Although evaporation rates are significantly lower during the cooler months, it is important to ensure constant moisture supply. The use of mulch will help to keep soils warm and limit the growth of weeds. Homemade compost will increase natural soil dynamics and improve soil structure while worm juice or diluted eaweed solution will nourish your crop vithout overfeeding them

FAUNA CORNER

Striated Pardalote

Description: Tiny colourful bird distinguished by white eyebrows with a yellow spot in front of the eye, olive-grey backs and a white stripe in the wing. Males and females have similar plumage with young birds being noticeably paler, especially on the crown and

Distribution: The Striated Pardalote occurs throughout most of Australia, with the exception of the most arid areas. It is commonly spotted in Karlkurla Bushland Park. Like other species of pardalotes, it is found only in Australia.

Habitat: Striated Pardalotes can adapt to almost any nabitat with trees or shrubs

TRACK YOUR HOUSEHOLD



Doing a simple waste audit and tracking your weekly household rubbish can help reduce your amount of landfill and non-organic recycling. A waste audit simply entails the recording of your outgoing waste.

This includes three main categories of waste you are likely to be dealing with: Recyclable (organic), Recyclable (non-organic) and Non-recyclable (Landfill). For a successful waste audit we recommend:

- Use the checklist below for at least a week to get an accurate overview of your household waste composition
- To avoid a smelly bin dive record your items as you throw them away and write them down straight away so you don't forget.
- If you have multiple bins in the house, consider keeping a list for each of them

After the Audit

Whatever your waste audit outcome might be – try to implement small realistic changes and after a while conduct another audit to see how you can further improve. Any small change you make will truly make a difference, and is a step towards living an eco-friendlier lifestyle.

Some tips for success:

- If you got plenty of recyclable organic waste and don't yet have a home composting system this might be a great time to get one
- If the audit reveals a large amount of plastic or paper this can be a great prompt to rethink packaging you bring home from the shops and find alternatives such as buying in bulk
- Try to get your household members and visitors on-board with the idea of reducing waste
