# PRICKLY PROBLEM RESO

he infestations of high priority invasive cactus located in Williamstown needed to be mechanically removed due to the size and density of the weeds. Chemical treatment would not have been effective, and would have required large volumes of chemical.

KBULG coordinated the removal of this infestation in conjunction with the major stakeholders below:

- CKB (City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder);
- BC&M (Boulder Contracting and Maintenance);
- DPaW (Department of Parks and Wildlife);
- **GNRBA** (Goldfields Nullarbor Rangelands Biosecurity Association);
- **DAFWA** (Department of Agriculture and Food WA): and
- KCGM (Kalgoorlie Consolidated Gold Mines)

Invasive cactus is a high priority declared weed in WA and infestations are legally required to be controlled from spreading under the Biosecurity and Agricultural Management Act (BAMA) 2007. This is the responsibility of the landholder. Many infestations around Kalgoorlie-Boulder have been successfully removed by appropriate chemical spraying or

mechanical removal (anything from a shovel to machinery), mostly by CKB and responsible landholders. The massive invasive cactus infestation at Williamstown posed an entirely different set of problems.

The invasive cactus infestations at Williamstown contained 5 species of invasive cactus and was spreading by seed and segments (carried on wildlife, pets, humans and vehicles). This poses a significant threat to other landholders and particularly to surrounding pastoral leases. GNRBA commenced liaison and negotiation with the multiple groups with tenure over the Williamstown cactus infestation sites in 2013, a very complicated process. In April 2016, GNRBA and KBULG called a stakeholder meeting and an agreement was made by all parties for a large collaborative effort, coordinated by KBULG, who have a history of successfully coordinating large community-based collaborations. This created an excellent community sense of purpose and achievement.

The size and density of the Williamstown invasive cactus infestations made chemical spraying non-viable and a large scale mechanical removal with heavy equipment was required. Each stakeholder made contributions, and which combined, made the project viable. It was simply too large and expensive for any one stakeholder to

attempt. GNRBA has done an enormous amount of work leading regional invasive cactus control collaborations, particularly with regional shires. Shire support has been outstanding, particularly CKB, Leonora, Laverton, Menzies, Wiluna, Coolgardie and Dundas shires, as has DPaW on their extensive land estate. This has all mainly been large scale chemical treatment. GNRBA has also tirelessly raised regional awareness of invasive cactus, particularly since its declaration by the WA government in December 2014.

KBULG conducted extensive community consultation, including letter drops around Williamstown prior to the removal to both raise awareness and keep the community informed of progress. This was so successful that Williamstown residents reported further infestations not previously located and which were added to the removal operation. KBULG also conducted regular liaison and coordination meetings with stakeholders, which culminated in two very outstanding days of "best practice" mechanical removal and then deep burial at the CKB waste refuse. This was so successful that DAFWA will use this as their example of a "best practice" mechanical removal process in an upcoming state-wide "best practice" invasive cactus manual.

KBULG's consultation, negotiation, liaison and coordination ensured a terrific community sense of achievement,

producing an excellent outcome on what was a significant and intractable issue for the Kalgoorlie-Boulder environment. Outstanding work was done by BC&M plant operators and CKB tip truck drivers.

It was of high standard and extremely professional. Not bad achieving "recognised national best practice" on their first large scale invasive cactus mechanical removal operation. BC&M contributed their entire work to our project (loader, grader, tip truck and 4 staff) at NO COST and to CKB who contributed - a total of 90 trips across the weighbridge and a total of 765 tonnes)! They are a credit to the Kalgoorlie-Boulder community.

DPaW. KBULG and DAFWA have commenced monitoring of the site for follow-up chemical treatment of small 'outlier' invasive cactus plants. These have been surveyed and mapped and treatment will soon follow on all previous infestation sites. This will be conducted monthly for some time. DAFWA have provided excellent support and best practice technical advice, in collaboration with the GNRBA.

This has been a MAJOR community project with significant environmental benefits














With the weather warming up, Spring is the perfect time for gardeners to be outdoors getting their hands dirty. Here are some quick tips to get you started this spring.

- Feed your citrus plants as this is a peak growth time for
- Put layers of mulch on your garden now before the heat hits. A thick layer of mulch saves water and provides nutrients to the soil below. Spread the mulch out but leave a gap around the stems/
- trunks of plants to allow water easy access to roots. For shape and appearance, you prune natives once they have finished flowering. Wax flower, Banksia,
- Grevillea, Boronia and Eremophilas like a light prune after flowers

### Eco and Cultural Education Centre

CKB for project advice and GEDC are providing the funds for the extension costs to the nursery compound and establishing the centre, along with disability toilets and access.



A classroom facility within the park will enable us to expand our community education programs and allow us to develop new initiatives such as special - interest and conservation awareness workshops/seminars across

all environmental and cultural aspects. The classroom will also permit us to host TAFE Horticultural and Conservation and Land Management courses which David Strickland, the TAFE lecturer conducts and also extend our Junior Landcare activities for the benefit of local schools.

Karlkurla Bushland Park is the largest recreational green space in the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder and visited by many community members. It has been our organisations plan/dream (initiated by the late Doug Krepp) whilst creating the park, to have an Education Centre established here. It provides the perfect setting, that will also be available to use by other community
