Thieves and vandals have again targeted Karlkurla Bushland Park, this time leaving the Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group more than \$20,000 out of pocket.

In the late hours of Wednesday or early hours of Thursday last week, KBULG's nursery com-pound was targeted by thieves who allegedly stole thousands of dol-lars in tools and the group's red maintenance buggy—estimated at \$12,000. The thieves allegedly broke the latch and pulled the sheeting off the park's shed to gain access to the tools and buggy.

This comes just weeks after
KBULG officially launched its ecocultural classroom, which was the
target of more than \$10,000 damage

target of more than \$10,000 damage earlier this year.

KBULG has now spent several thousand dollars upgrading the security on the site, with cameras, alarms and monitoring systems in every part of the compound.

KBULG chief executive Kim Eckert said this was the fifth Eckert said this was the fifth break-in in recent years and she was "heartbroken, devastated and exhausted".
"Just leave us alone and let us get on with doing good work for the community," she said.
Worried the park would again be targeted before the security could be upgraded, Ms Eckert said she had camped in the office last week.

had camped in the office last week.

"I just felt like I needed to be there to protect the park," she said.

She called for the community to She called for the community to keep an eye out for the park's electric red buggy, which was used to maintain the 200ha park and more than 7km of trails.

"It would be one of a kind in our area and not hard to spot, so if you see it, or hear or know anything about the break-in, please let the police know," she said.

Ms Eckert said the incident highlighted an ongoing issue in the

lighted an ongoing issue in the community which needed to be addressed.

"We know we are not the only ones being targeted, we know it runs deeper and I think we just need to try and help those people making these decisions, because they obviously need help," she said.

"It is sad they feel they have to go to these lengths.

"Are they doing it for cash? Or just for kicks?
"We need to work that out and as

a community try to resolve these issues."

Volunteers needed to plant trees at Gribble Creek

Gribble Creek is the next location to receive some green-thumb love this weekend for Kalgoorlie-Boulder Tree Planting Day.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group is calling for community volunteers to help plant about 3000 seedlings along the Lionel and Vivian Street end of the creek on Sunday

Coinciding with National Tree Day, the planting aims to encourage the community to play arole in the beautification and rehabilitation of the bushland around the city, as well as help to reduce dust.

KBULG chief executive Kim Eckert said she hoped to see as many people turn up as possible.

Last year, about 150 volunteers planted 3000 seedlings along Gatacre Drive. "It is always the busiest week of the year for us because, aside from the community event, we also run tree-planting workshops in schools around town," she said.

"This is really important work so we are calling on everyone who has time, even if it is just half an hour, to come along and help us.

"The council will prepare the ground so all we have to do is plant them."

KBULG will be at East Kalgoorlie Primary School today, helping to plant trees, and two visits are planned for St Mary's Primary School this week.

Plants were also donated to Wiluna Remote Community School to help the school join in the national celebration.

A free sausage sizzle and drinks will be available at the tree planting, which takes place from 9-11am.

Three thousand native seedlings were planted at Gribble Creek yesterday as Kalgoorlie-Boulder residents got their hands dirty supporting the environment and the community.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group chief executive Kim Eckert said the planting played an important role in the beautification and rehabilitation of the bushland around the city.

"It is particularly important for reducing dust and decreasing the salinity around Gribble Creek," she said.

"The council have done a fantastic job of preparing the ground, within 12 months we will see some growth and after 18 months to two

years it will look fantastic. The seedlings will be reticulated for 12-18 months, but then because all the plants are native we will be

able to scale back the watering."
Ms Eckert said she was pleased support for the event seemed to be growing each year.

"I think we are all coming together in supporting the environment more and more these days and it's a really good way for young families to engage with the community and the environment," she said. "It is always a really great community and family event, and this year was an absolutely fantastic turnout."

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Rotary Club donated \$1500 towards the cost of the plants and to help KBULG upgrade its security after a number of break-ins at its nursery in Kalkurla Bushland Park.

"All three Rotary groups in Kal came along, the Rotary world president this year wants every member to plant one tree, so they definitely did their part," Ms Eckert said.

First-class training facility unveiled

The classroom, which was targeted by vandals in March, putting off its opening date, was officially unveiled in honour of the former City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder councillor on 28 June 2017.

Mr Krepp's widow, Eileen, made the trip from Mandurah to open the building alongside Mayor John Bowler.

Mrs Krepp said the opening was a fitting occasion to mark and remember the park which her husband took responsibility for. "He would have been very proud of the development that occurred and will continue since his passing".

The transportable classroom was donated by Central Regional TAFE and what started off as a \$45,000 gift, turned into a \$260,000 project.

turned into a \$260,000 project.
Upgrades to the nursery were required to establish the classroom, including extending the compound, installing

disability toilets, carpark, ramps, rails and the door of the classroom widened for access.

A grant from the Goldfields-Esperance Development Commission (GEDC) Regional Grants Scheme allowed this project to become a reality, almost project to become a reality, almost \$109,000 was secured, contributions from GEMG, KCGM, DPaW, Pindan, Central Regional TAFE, Evolution Mining, the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder and KBULG saw the completion of the education centre, 16 months later.

KBULG Staff, board members and valunteers worked tirelessly during the project and now we have a first-class training facility whereby Horticulture and Conservation and Land Management

- The same concept for managing your winter compost heap applie as any other time, with layers of browns and greens. The best compost piles layer green kitche scraps, fresh garden waste, etc. with browns that include straw newspaper and dead leaves.
- The only difference with winter composting is that you do not have to turn the pile as much. Frequent turning of the winter compost heap may result in heat escape, so it is best to keep turning to a minimal.
- Since the cold weather slows down decomposition, reducing t size of your compost pieces help Chop up food scraps before plac winter compost bin and shred up mower before adding them to t pile moist but not soggy. A good excess moisture is to add in som to absorb the water.

WINTER gardening guide



- Winter is a good time to carry out major landscaping tasks in the garden. Keep efficient use of water in mind in terms of plant types and watering systems.
- Pruning and weeding is a top job to do at this time of year. Deciduous fruit trees love a good old haircut now, except for your apricot!
- Check the soil moisture before watering and hold off if it has recently rained. If watering is needed do it first thing in the morning. A decent drenching a couple of times a week is better than a quick daily water.
- Top up mulch on you veggie patch, herb garden and ornamental beds. Try to mulch, after watering, to a depth of about 7cm and be careful not to cover delicate young seedlings. Choose sustainable, low

- environmental impact mulch, one that will enrich your soil as it breaks down.
- Feed winter flowering plants and leafy winter vegetables with a seaweed tea or low environmental impact liquid fetiliser.
- Move deciduous trees and shrubs while they are dormant. Winter is also a good time for transplanting evergreen trees and shrubs as the cooler weather reduces stress.
- Spread blood and bone all over the garden, including the compost heap.
- Winter is the time to plant citrus and barerooted deciduous fruit trees. Pick trees with a nice shape, and don't forget to prune them back before you plant them out (best thing to do is ask the local nursery to do it for you). Remember to make sure you have the correct

As the country switches its focus to keeping Australia beautiful this week, Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group chief executive Kim Eckert said not much would change on the agenda of the group, which "tries to keep Kalgoorlie-Boulder beautiful all the time".

Ms Eckert said KBULG always tried to promote sustainability and cleaning up of the town's litter through various initiatives, which it would continue to enforce this week for Keep Australia Beautiful Week.

She said the group organised clean-ups around Kalgoorlie-Boulder every day and undertook maintenance at Karlkurla Bushland Park several times a week.

"We focus on biosecurity, conservation and attraction," she said.

"We are committed, along with the City, to keep Kalgoorlie-Boulder beautiful all the time." Ms Ekert said KBULG had recently become a finalist in the 2017 State Landcare Awards, with the winners to be announced at a gala in Perth next Wednesday.

Dozens of cacti were removed from Williamstown to encourage the growth of native plants, and Ms Eckert said the project had received great support from the community, especially Williamstown residents.

"I don't know if we've entered these awards in the past, but it's the first time I have since being chief executive and it's a fantastic opportunity and a great community outcome," she said.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder has been recognised at a State level, with the city being named as a finalist in five of seven Tidy Towns Sustainable Communities categories and vying for the overall State title.

Out of 42 entries from regional communities across the State, the city is one of six WA towns to get through to the finals.

It has been recognised in the general appearance, community action and wellbeing, litter-prevention and waste management, environmental sustainability and environmental education categories.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group chief executive Kim Eckert said regardless of the outcome, being recognised across so many platforms in environmental sustainability was a matter of pride for the city.

"There has been fantastic community collaboration in working on different projects to better this town, including Heartwalk, the Hormone Hoedown, Goldfields Girl, Kalgoorlie-Boulder Community Garden, the Recycling Bin Tag project, and the Williamstown Cactus project," she said.



Goldfields community programs make finals

Three of the nine programs in the running for the Community Partnership Resources Sector Award are in the Goldfields.

The finalists include Teach Learn Grow and the Independence Group's Rural Tutoring Program, KCGM and the Kalgoorlie Boulder Urban Landcare Group's Environmental and Sustainability Partnership, and the Wiluna Martu Ranger Program, run by Tarlka Matuwa Piarku Aboriginal Corporation and Central Desert Native Title Services in conjunction with Northern Star Resources.

KCGM and KBULG have been working collaboratively on sustainability projects since 2005.

The partnership has worked on several key cultural and environmental awareness events, including the Karlkurla Dreaming Culture Trail, the annual Community Tree Planting Day and the Sustainable Garden Competition.

The Rural Tutoring Program offers one-on-one tutoring to primary school students in the Goldfields-Esperance region, including children from Leonora, Coolgardie, Norseman, Esperance and Kalgoorlie-Boulder.

Teach Learn Grow chief executive Ella Gansield said the organi-

sation used separate programs to provide academic support and help with attendance among socio-disadvantaged students.

"We send students from Perth universities to areas across the State for two weeks out of the year, one in summer and one in winter," she said.

"During each one-week period every child receives 10 hours per week of one-on-one tutoring, which adds up to one hour per fortnight over the school year.

"The Independence Group is one of our most supportive sponsors

and focus on community engagement, even coming to the schools to see the program in action."

The Wiluna Martu Ranger Program is another finalist, and the first project to pair the skills of rangers in remote WA with the resources of a mining company.

In its seventh year, it runs a team of rangers on a fly-in, fly-out basis from Wiluna to Jundee to work on environmental compliance and natural resource management.

CDNTS desert support services partnership manager Richard Gordine said after so many years the project had developed a skilled pool of Martu people to work on the land.

"Similar projects are now operating in other parts of WA—including the Northern Star Kalgoorlie operations— and in the Northern Territory," he said.

The award winners will be announced at the Awards for Excellence night on Thursday, October 26, along with the prestigious Golden Gecko environmental excellence award and the inaugural Safety and Health Resources Sector Awards.

tion that removed 750 tonnes of invasive cacti from the area. A 120kW solar photovoltaic

A 120kW solar photovoltaic system installed at Kalgoorlie-Boulder Airport and a similar 80kW system installed on the roof of Goldfields Arts Centre were also credited for leading the way in green energy technology.

A bin tagging trial that has halved the number of non-recyc-

lable items in Kalgoorlie-Boulder's recycling bins, after contamina-tion rates peaked above 50 per cent in 2015-16, was also lauded, along with the Paula Fletcher-led Heartwalk public art project, which saw more than 20 empty shopfront windows on Hannan Street livened up with murals by local artists in

Environment Minister Stephen

Dawson said Kalgoorlie-Boulder demonstrated the communitywide approach could enhance cultural life and environmental sustainability in the regions.

We are a tidy city, and our community obviously takes pride in this. I take particular pride in the fact that over the past month I have been sought out by visitors wanting to compliment the City on how tidy and well-presented Kalgoorlie-Boulder is. While much credit is definitely

A great idea planted

Without trees, not only would the landscape of Kalgoorlie-Boulder and the Goldfields be barren, but also we might be choking in dust.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group's website tells the story about the Goldfields Dust Abatement Committee, the organisation it replaced in 1994.

The website said the committee was established in 1973 in response to severe dust storms that affected the city, and one of the actions it took was to establish six regeneration zones around the city.

"Initially, the zones were established to control the dust in Kalgoorlie-Boulder," the website said.

One of these zones has become the excellent Karlkurla Bushland Park, which contains a wide variety of trees and vegetation, including many species native to the Goldfields.

So we need trees, and we need to act when storms such as the one on

November 18 destroy so many of them. Mayor John Bowler estimated the storm smashed about 2000, and he has announced the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder Council is embarking on the biggest and most ambitious street-tree planting program in a century.

He said the council's street-tree program had seen 400 young trees planted along many of the main thoroughfares in Kalgoorlie-Boulder this year.

"The trouble is, those numbers have been dwarfed by the destruction ... and while the new trees will take decades to reach maturity, we have to start somewhere," he said.

"Some we have lost were a century old and while we can't do anything about that, what we can do is assure the community that council replants those lost."

Residents could play their part in the long-term recovery project by looking after young trees immediately in front of their property, he said.

Crime keeps cops busy in eventful 2017

Joanna Delalande takes a look at the year that was for police patrolling the region

Goldfields-Esperance police dealt with everything from drug seizures and assaults to reptile trafficking in what was another tumultuous year for the region in 2017.

2017.

At the start of the year, Gold-fields-Esperance District Superintendent Darryl Gaunt described Kalgoorlie-Boulder as "a big city with big problems" after it was revealed crime in Kalgoorlie-Boulder was up 19 per cent to date on the past financial year.

Burelaries and domestic vice.

Burglaries and domestic vio-lence were notable increases, and this announcement seemed to set

the tone for the rest of 2017. Hannan Street businesses went on lockdown in February to protect themselves against "brazen and opportunistic" attacks from

people on the street.
Unique Skin Boutique owner
Cherie May said she was surrounded by eight young people who



She said the incident, which happened while she was 24 weeks pregnant, had left her scared to the point her business' door was locked almost more often than it was unlocked.

Shortly afterwards, staff at Boulder's Albion Hotel bottleshop were under siege, suffering rock and spade-throwing attacks and

thefts at the business.

In May, a local family were shaken to find their miniature piglet had been attacked and one of its ears sliced off.

Home burglaries were up that

Home burglaries were up that month, with 74 reports in May compared with 54 in April.

A man was held at knifepoint while four people rummaged through his home in the early hours of the morning, taking whatever they could find of value. Goldfields-Esperance Police Inspector Tony Colfer said at the time police were "bombarded" with burglaries.

Kalzoorlie detectives investigat-

Kalgoorlie detectives investigat-ed two armed hold-ups in Kalgoor-lie-Boulder in less than a week in July after a woman was threatened and a large quantity of cash was stolen from Orana Cinemas.

Thieves and vandals targeted Karlkurla Bushland Park, leaving the Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group more than \$20,000 out of pocket, and the Kalgoorlie-

Boulder Pistol Club was vandal-

ised three times during the year.
On one occasion, offenders left the building trashed and on another they stole a urinal and ceramic sinks.

In September, it was revealed thefts in Esperance had risen almost 80 per cent since the same time the previous year, which off-icer-in-charge Senior Sergeant Richard Moore attributed to unemployment, illicit substance abuse and carelessness. Kalgoorlie-Boulder's volume

crime squad issued more than 250 charges throughout the year, most of them to repeat-offending youths

aged 10-18 who were after money for drugs and alcohol. Drugs were also on police's radar after Kalgoorlie-Boulder was identified as WA's new meth capital in June.

In March, more than \$1 million worth of drugs were seized from Kalgoorlie-Boulder streets and a woman was charged with 49 offenc-es after an operation in which detectives, police and the canine unit carried out more than 20 search warrants, resulting in 24 people being charged with more than 100 drug-related offences. About \$250,000 worth of methy-

lamphetamine was seized and another 43 people were charged after another drug operation the following month.

In September, the Organised Crime Squad visited Kalgoorlie-Boulder as part of the State Gov-ernment's meth strategy, stopping nearly 400 cars and charging six

people with drug-related offences. Eucla police made an unlikely seizure when they stopped nine

seizure when they stopped nine tiger snakes from crossing the border into South Australia.

Constable Luci Cleghorn said when a male driver was asked if he had weapons or drugs in the car, he said he did not — but he did have nine protected venomous tiger snakes

In November, the Cold Case Homicide Squad arrived in town to continue investigations into the disappearance and suspected murder of Goldfields woman Lisa Govan 18 years ago.

Police Commissioner Chris Dawson said there had been "very credible" information provided to police about Ms Govan's disappearance.

Detectives used a concrete cutter

to break the floor of the old Deroes clubhouse, now a shed at Zarraffa's Coffee carpark on Boul-

der Road. Searches were also car-ried out at the new Deroes club-

house and the one in Perth.

Police also confirmed human remains found in a vehicle in January were those of 38-year-old Samuel Mark Walsh, or Enoch Samuel Wright, who killed his mother in 2005 and escaped from a Claremont care facility in October,

A man died in police custody in December as a result of a car accident.

Police were following a car with no registration plates in Boulder when the vehicle collided with a

The 27-year-old driver, who allegedly fled the scene, was charged with dangerous driving resulting in death.

In April, Goldfields-Esperance District Inspector Tony Colfer said he was concerned about "the impact to the community overall' if the trial of the man who ran over and killed Boulder teenager Elijah

Doughty in August, 2016, was held in Kalgoorlie-Boulder. The trial was held in Perth, but residents expressed their dismay at the decision nonetheless, with non-violent protests taking place on Hannan Street after the trial

Several people died on Goldfields roads during the year, with several more injured in car rollovers.

More injured in car rollovers.

A 10-year-old boy died after a crash on the Coolgardie-Esperance Highway east of Widgie-mooltha, and a 27-year-old Boulder man died after a crash in West Lamington, both in January.

A man was killed and a woman flown to hospital after a crash on Great Eastern Highway Great East near Merredin.

Police confirmed the man, aged in his 40s, was a passenger in the ute, which was travelling east before it left the road and hit a tree about 10.30am.

Summer rain prompts campaign to control caltrop

A series of heavy summer rainfalls created the perfect conditions for the harmful plant caltrop to thrive, sparking a campaign urging Kalgoorlie-Boulder residents to identify and destroy the weed.

Caltrop, famous for its noto-riously painful "doublegees", is a summer-growing weed that is a major contaminant of produce for pastoral lands and is dangerous to

animals. The plant can grow rapidly after summer rains and is particularly prevalent in the Goldfields, spurring the Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group and the Goldfields Nullarbor Rangelands Biosecurity Association to begin the Caltrop Eradication Cam-

KBULG chief executive Kim Eckert said Kalgoorlie-Boulder had such a problem with caltrop because after the weed spread once, it was extremely difficult to eradicate completely

"We as a community have been fighting it for years," she said.

"The seeds, when they do drop,

can lay dormant for seven years.
"These seeds are easily spread.

"They spread on shoes, tyres and just about anything. If they were to get onto pastoral areas they would be devastating to the environment.

"Over the last few years we haven't had a whole lot of summer

rain but this year we have decided to do another campaign to raise awareness and to get the community on the lookout.

'We want people to bag them and bin them, which will mean the seeds don't lie there dormant but ready to reoccur.

KBULG and GNRBA are offering free bottles of herbicide and the chance to win an iPad for all those who register a clean-up site through kbulg.org.au.

Branded bag part of plastic ban conversation

Kalgoorlie-Boulder retailers are suggesting that a locally produced and branded bag be used as a cheaper alternative to reuseable bags once the State's plastic bag ban comes into effect.

The idea was brought up at a workshop held at the Kalgoorlie-Boulder Lotteries House on Wednesday night by the Department of Water and Environmental Regulation, at which attendees were encouraged to ask questions and raise concerns about the ban.

When legislation comes in banning single-use plastic bags from all WA retail stores on July 1, chains like Woolworths and Coles will have access to a range of alternative options, including reuseable and recyclable bags.

However, smaller retail stores will need to decide what changes they want to make to adhere to the ban.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group chief executive Kim Eckert said some small retailers at the workshop were concerned about the financial strain of buying reuseable bags for their store.

"Someone suggested we collectively produce a bag, that would be a Kalgoorlie-Boulder bag, and that could be available at a cheaper price," she said.

Ms Eckert said the department had also used the workshop to discuss the implications of the ban, and to direct people to a discussion paper on its website through which they could write public submissions.

A spokeswoman for Environment Minister Stephen Dawson said the proposed lightweight bag ban was the best way to reduce littering and associated environmental impacts.

She said Coles, Woolworths and IGA had independently committed to banning lightweight single-use plastic bags by July 1, while Bunnings and Aldi had already phased out their use.

A survey of WA households in November found 84 per cent of respondents supported a ban on lightweight single-use plastic bags.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder won the State Tidy Town Award in 2017 due to a number of sustainability and environmental projects driven by local community groups and the City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder.

The Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group coordinated the submission and City tour, which began with a cultural and environmental display at Karlkurla Bushland Park.

Other tour highlights included the Williamstown Cactus Eradication project, the LED lighting replacement at Hannan Street, and the Heartwalk Art Trail through the CBD.

The City will be judged for the national title in Barmera in South Australia in early April, where it is hoped Kalgoorlie-Boulder will take home its first National Tidy Towns Award.

Cashless Debit Card Confirmed

The Cashless Debit Card will be rolled out from March 2018 in the local government areas of Kalgoorlie-Boulder, Laverton, Leonora, Coolgardie and Menzies.

Around 3,600 people who are recipients of working age payments (for example Newstart Allowance and Youth Allowance) will receive the card. The rollout is expected to be completed by June 2018.

Aged Pension and Veterans' Pension recipients will not be included, however they can volunteer to be part of the program.

The Goldfields region was selected for its introduction based on the support of community leaders and a demonstrable need identified - including the higher than average rate of domestic and non-domestic assaults.

There will be an intense effort on the ground in the Goldfields to transition people onto the card.

Illegal dumping crackdown

The scourge of illegal dumping costs Kalgoorlie-Boulder rate-payers \$75,000 a year and the council has declared it is going to ensure offenders are held accountable.

City chief executive John Walker said it was a big issue and he urged residents to dob in dumpers.

"We need the community's help to tackle this issue and will be throwing the book at anyone we can prove is illegally dumping," he said.

impacts the image of our City."

The council has recently stated it will look at raising commercial tipping fees at the Yarri Road refuse facility and Mr Walker said though there was a risk it could exacerbate the problem, it was unlikely to have a major impact.

"The majority of dumping we investigate is generally domestic waste, despite the landfill remaining free to domestic residents," he said.

"We will be improving our campaigns against illegal dumping to make sure any future decisions by the City don't increase illegal dumping."

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group chief executive Kim Eckert echoed Mr Walker's assertion it was mainly household items being dumped and said she failed to understand why people thought it was OK to dump their waste illegally,

"It's nothing new unfortunately," she said. "It's been a big problem and it has been for a long time.

"I really don't understand why the illegal dumping is happening because residents have free access to a tip which is open seven days a

"There is a lot of household dumping and I think it might be because the population is transient and people leave town and perhaps don't want to take things with them."

Ms Eckert said she supported the City's drive to stamp down on illegal dumping.

"I think we need to work together and help report illegal dumping so people understand there will be consequences," she said.

"If people are not getting in trouble for doing something they will keep doing it so I think if we can promote the awareness that it is not OK."

Kalgoorlie-Boulder in mix for national Tidy Towns title

Kalgoorlie-Boulder is among the six finalists in the running to be crowned Australia's tidiest town for 2018 at the national Keep Australia Beautiful Tidy Towns awards ceremony to be held in South Australia tonight.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder was named the WA State winner in October and is up against State finalists Orange, Finke, Kimba, Smithton and Beechworth, for the national title.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group chief executive Kim Eckert is representing Kalgoorlie-Boulder and WA at the awards with Keep Australia Beautiful WA chairman Michael Aspinall.

KBULG was instrumental in the State victory, notably for co-ordinating the massive cactus eradication project in Williamstown, east of town in an inter-agency collaboration that removed 750 tonnes of invasive cacti from the area.

Mrs Eckert said it was an honour to represent the community and she hoped to return with another title for the city.

"I think our city has done some

absolutely fantastic sustainability projects in the last few years," she said.

"I am very pleased to be able to say we are State winners and we can be really proud to have come this far

"Things like our Williamstown cactus project, the Heartwalk project, the environment education centre, which was built and opened last year, and the bin tagging project the City implemented, which increased our recycling rates from 49 per cent to 81 per cent, have all been fantastic. Hopefully we can at

least win a category — it is pretty challenging to be the best in the nation, particularly being so remote and in an arid environment, but we are hoping for the best."

Tidy Towns has been running nationally since 1990, and began in WA in 1968.

City of Kalgoorlie-Boulder chief executive John Walker said the City was thrilled to be up for the national Tidy Towns award.

If Kalgoorlie-Boulder takes the title, it will win the right to host the awards ceremony next year.


"There were only six categories

If you don't have a programmable thermostat on your heater, place a thermometer in your thermometer in your living area to keep an eye on the temperature. And think of putting on a jumper before turning up the heat.

Close off any rooms that are not in use Furniture can't feel the cold so why waste energy

cold so why waste energy heating areas that you're not using?
A great way to keep the heat where you want it is to keep the doors to your living space closed. It's obvious, but we often forget this idea, which allows the heating to work

efficiently in the space that's actually in use.

heaters Getting your heater serviced professionally at least every two years will keep it running more efficiently. Keeping heaters free of dust and cleaning any filters regularly will also help.

"We stop at various plants and we talk about their properties and what the Aboriginal people used to use them for and what they probably still do use them for," she

"There is the medicine bush, for example, which has good properties to aid digestive ailments, can be used as an anti-inflammatory and is reputedly used for cancer as

"Then there are the sandalwood trees which produce nuts and the silky pear which is our local native fruit which is where Kalgoorlie gets its name from."

Ms Eckert said the tours were informative and aimed to unite people through sharing stories.

"Being a not-for-profit organisation what we are trying to make it an informative and enjoyable morning for people to learn and share the knowledge," she said.

"It's definitely a beautiful morning walk through the park learning about the native flora and local Aboriginal culture in terms of

The celebration of all things Calgoorlie-Boulder steps up from his Saturday, when the main week of the town's 125th universary celebrations takes

A Heart of Gold discovery trail and app launch takes place at Calgoorlie Town Hall on Saturday it 9.30am, and there is also the inveiling of a Perth Mintcommissioned gold ingot statue and information board outside City Markets Arcade on Hannan Street at 10am.

Later that day is a multicultural estival outside the Goldfields Art Centre and Lord Forrest Olympic Pool park.

Karlkurla Dreaming Culture lour events take place in Karlkurla Bushland Park on Tuesday and Friday next week, with the Kalgoorlie-Boulder Jrban Landcare Group set to inform people about bush nedicine, native flora and distorical Goldfields stories.

Gold was the reason for the foundation of the city, with June 14, 1893, pencilled in as the official date thanks to Paddy Hannan, Tom Flanagan and Dan Shea.

The most glamorous of minerals has been the mainstay of the Goldfields' economy ever since, with other minerals such as nickel and lithium playing their part in more recent times.

The gold industry has seen the region make a huge contribution to the State and national economy. But Kalgoorlie-Boulder and the Goldfields also gained a reputation across the years as a "wild west" town full of hotels and hard-drinking miners, with TV programs such as Kalgoorlie Cops reinforcing this reputation.

But this is not what many want the city to be in the future, and the process of a transformation into a family-friendly city of permanent residents is ongoing.

Yesterday's Growing Kalgoorlie-Boulder 2018 event at the Hyatt Regency Perth is part of this process, with a range of business and political leaders pitching the benefits of life away from the helter-skelter of metropolitan areas.

Also, the Chamber of Commerce and Industry recently initiated a survey seeking the stories of those people who had chosen life in the Goldfields after living in metropolitan areas

It was seeking to uncover and publicise hard data such as travel time, living costs and activity comparisons.

The process of transforming a community is long-term and can only be judged in such a way.

It faces many challenges, including some — such as global economic shifts — which are outside the control of locals.

But change does occur, and will continue to do so in the future — although it might not always be to the liking of locals.

However, think about what has happened during the past 30 years.

Locals tell me until the 1990s, the western edge of the city was the Overland Hotel, across the road from Centennial Park on Great Eastern Highway.

There is a lot more housing and industry in the west nowadays.

So in another 20 years time, we will have a better idea of the success of ventures such as Growing Kalgoorlie-Boulder 2018.

Bush tucker tutor puts flora on the menu

Food science technology students at Eastern Goldfields College were given a taste of the natural ingredients and flavours on offer in their own backyards at a unique school workshop last week.

Kalgoorlie-Boulder Urban Landcare Group administration assistant Sue Astill brought a raft of native ingredients, including Karlkurlas, or silky pears, for which Karlkurla Park in Hannans is named, and guided the students through a cooking tutorial

through a cooking tutorial.

"I was telling them about the local bush tucker and food that is available up at Karlkurla Park and in the Goldfields area," Mrs Astill

"The main one is the Karlkurla, the silky pear. They can be roasted or eaten fresh.

"The silky seeds fly off in the wind and plants itself. You have also got the quandong seeds, which

can be roasted and ground up to make quandong jam.

"It is teaching the students about the local environment and knowledge in case they are ever caught out in the bush.

"It is also having that connection with Aboriginal people and traditional ways of life as well." Food science technologies teach-

er Anna Gavan said the class was an engaging and informative exercise for the Year 12 students.

"In a nutshell for their local food component of their assessment,

Sue came in to explain what you can find in and around Kalgoorlie-Boulder, what is in season and what is available," she said.

"The students cooked using native spices. It cements what they 'kind of' already know is available."
