- Winter isn't just soup and stew season for the heartiness of these meals it also helps to keep the whole house warm. Make the most of the oven this winter, bake to your heart's content, slow cook lovely meals and warm your house at the same time.
- Don't forget to dress warm, enjoy the chance to wear beanies and keep your head warm. Break out the Ugg boots or slippers to keep your feet warm too. Any exposed area of skin is a heat loss zone and remember it is easier to warm yourself up then it is to warm a hole house.
- Have you been eveing up a beautiful fluffy blanket at your favourite store? Winter is the perfect time to buy that big blanket and snuggle up with a loved one on the couch. Body heat is a great way to stay warm.



- Don't forget your hot drinks to keep your fingers warm and you warm
- Hot water bottles are a great and inexpensive way to stay warm; yes they are an oldie but a goody. Before you go to bed pop it on the spot where you get the coldest and climb into a warm bed.
- Time to rug up not you but your floor. Putting rugs on the floor not only stops your feet from cooling you down but it also creates a buffer between your warm house and your cold floor.
- Program your reverse cycle to warm the room when you're in it or to come on just before you come home from a hard day of work. Remember it doesn't have to be set at 30 degrees to keep you warm, keeping the house or room at 20 to 22 degrees will keep the room comfortable and won't break the bank come bill time.

A: Try a potato bag

Use the bottom of the egg carton and the toilet roles as seedling starters, the best bit is you just have to plant them in the ground as is and the little seedling pot will decompose in the soil. Stop buying the plastic seedling starters from your local nursery and grow those little seedlings yourself.

COMPOSTING TIPS FOR WINTER

- Turn less in winter so you do not lose too much heat from your compost
- Move your compost to a sunny spot in the
- Use layers of leaves, straw, cardboard or sawdust to help insulate and keep warmth in your compost
- To get the warmth of your pile up add nitrogen rich materials (so green materials), brown materials like dried leaves are rich in carbon.
- Getting rid of weed seeds in your compost come winter is all about keeping it hot, hot, hot so make sure you turn your compost to get those seeds into the centre but not too much that you are losing heat. Compost tumblers are a great option come winter for composting



COMPOSTING IN SMALL SPACES

A whopping 62% of Australian landfill consists of food waste so here are some composting options for you

Houses with little to no space

Bokashi Bins are compact, odourless and provide you with a way to turn your household food scraps into food for your indoor and outdoor plants. By composting your household scraps you keep them out of landfill and return nutrients to the plants.

Worm Bins are a great way to turn food scraps into compost for your garden and are a great activity for the whole family, getting the kids involved helps to educate them about composting and about food in general

Houses with small backyards

Worm bin or compost tumblers are a great option for those who don't like worms and don't have time or space for compost piles. Fill your tumbler up and a couple of times a week give it a spin and let it do its thing. Soon enough you will have lovely healthy compost for the garden.

Houses with a large backyard

Standing compost bin or compost tumbler If you have more space maybe consider getting a trio of open based enclosed compost bins. Set them up side by side and while one is composting you can move to the next bin and so on until you have a cycle of composting going on in your own
