Prepare your Soils - Wa's soils are not very good at holding water or nutrients, Kalgoorlie soils particularly so, this spring why not add in some soil improvers and wetting agents to give your plants the best possible chance of survival

Irrigation - Remember to give your irrigation system a good once over to make sure there are no broken parts and you're not just watering your driveway if the sprinklers have got

turned around Mulch - It's time to Mulch... The bigger the better. Mulch is a great way to stop water loss during the Summer months when it's starting to heat up and for Kalgoorlie stopping water loss is very important. **Choosing your plants**

carefully - as much as we would love a rainforest in the back yard you have to choose plants that suit your climate so that means choosing waterwise

survive in arid climates. So choose your varieties carefully and make sure you put them in the right Nursery between 8:30am and 11:30am Monday to Friday to chat to our friendly staff about what natives we can help you get into your garden.

LOCAL **PLANT PROFILE**

Eremophila Racemosa

Common Name: Showy Eremophila

Eremophila - desert lover & Racemosa - bunch of

Size and Form: Erect shrub, can reach 2 m high x 2 m wide. Flowers from March to December. This plant is aptly named as the flowers change colour as they age from bud to full

yellow, orange and then red to pink or from yellow to white. As flowers open from the bottom to the top a beautiful multi-coloured effect is produced when

Leaves: Green oblong, glabrous leaves approximately 18-43 mm long and 2.4-6mm wide.

Everyone loves their lawn to be green during summer but it can take its toll on the water supply so even if your property doesn't have a sprinkler system all set up, there are a number of simple steps you can take to promote a healthier lawn and garden with less water this summer:

STEP ON IT Grass doesn't always need water just because it's hot out. Step on the lawn, and if

the grass springs back, it doesn't need water An inexpensive soil moisture sensor can also show the amount of moisture at the plant's roots and discourage overwatering **LEAVE IT LONG Raise**

Longer grass promotes deeper root growth. resulting in a more drought-resistant lawn, reduced evaporation, and fewer weeds **SMART WATERING**

Make sure you are watering early morning; this enables the water to be used effectively by the lawn during the day as

it photosynthesises and means it will soak into the soil and not be lost to evaporation

Watering less frequently for longer periods of time will help to train your lawn causing it to establish its roots deeper in the ground promoting a more sustainable and resilient lawn during the summer

_____ CAUTION BEWARE OF SNAKES BETWEEN OCTOBER TO MARCH

Did you know that snakes are incredibly beneficial to the ecosystems ...no...well they control the population of several pests including mice, cockroaches and other insects.

However we really don't need them in our yards. So this summer make sure to snake proof your property and protect your family, human and four legged

with these simple tips. · Keep your yard clutter free. Snakes love to hide under piles of stuff it's a safe place for them and a great spot to sneak up on a meal so make sure you clean your yard of any piles of wood, mulch or anything else that forms a pile

· Clean up under vour plants. Easiest way is to trim the bottom of your plants just so they are not resting on the ground, leave 10-20cms of clearance underneath. · Make sure you're not providing a buffet for the snakes by controlling the pests around your house Snakes will come looking for food and if you have some tasty treats living in your yard then the snakes will follow. Try laying traps or spraying repellents to keep those pests far away from your

house.

Patch up any holes in the fence to prevent snakes from getting into your vard and if you suspect there may be a snake in the vard why not mow the lawn (in sturdy work boots) the vibrations and noise maybe enough to scare off your un-invited and unwanted guest.

Walking your dog in Karlkurla **Bushland Park**

Karlkurla Bushland Park is a great place to walk your dog and enjoy the great outdoors but please remember that our park is a multi-use area that everyone in the community enjoys so here are some things to remember when you're taking your four legged friend for a walk.

Your dog must **ALWAYS** keep them safe on a lead be on the lead. Karlkurla Bushland Park is not an 'off leash' zone.

Dogs allowed to roam are a threat to local wildlife and vice versa wildlife can be a threat to your dog especially as we head into the warmer months, so

where you can see them. A \$100 fine can also apply if your dog is caught of their lead. Have a dog tidy bag with you to clean

up after your dog, we have them at most of the entry points in the park so there is no excuse to not grab a

couple and tie them you your pocket ready to go You can be fined \$200 for not cleaning up after your fury friend.

If everyone follows these two simple rules the park can be enjoyed by all, dog, human and wildlife alike.

What are indigenous Plants? Indigenous plants are local native plants that grow naturally in your area. Many have colourful and attractive flowers and striking foliage that look great in gardens. There are many benefits to planting indigenous plants into your garden.

MAINTENANCE

The benefit of local plants is they are already adapted to the abiotic factors of their environments, including soil nutrients, climate, as well as being suited for the biotic factors like the local animals. They will thrive in the local area with no need for constant watering, fertilising or pesticides once they have established themselves

PROVIDE FOOD AND SHELTER FOR

NATIVE WILDLIFE By planting even a few indigenous plants you're helping to support the natural ecosystem, providing food and shelter for birds and insects local to your area.

ENHANCE THE

LANDSCAPE Indigenous plants reflect the character and charm of your local area and their unique style contributes to a sense of local identity as well as adding depth to your garden.

WHAT CAN

YOU DO? Planting indigenous plants doesn't mean you have to turn your garden into bushland, you can start just be incorporating a few plants into your garden and mixing and matching your natives and your exotics. Help put a bit of biodiversity in your garden and help the local ecosystem
