Ark. The Corona Virus
Pandemic caused Planet

will create a natural buffer
between the residential

This planting finished
off the 3 year project of
3 separate but adjacent
plantings.

Corona's presence has limited our manpower at the Nursery and made it challenging to get the usual volume of seedlings propagated and potted, and hindered our ongoing

building of our shed (¾ finished). However, with proper precautions we are now able to allow volunteers back into the Nursery to help with these important tasks.

When we think Spring here at KBULG we think Sustainable Garden Quest, and are delighted that we can still hold this wonderful event, inspiring the gardeners and conservationists of Kalgoorlie- Boulder to showcase their gardens for us.


recycling and reuse of common household waste, and giving the children and parents a good reason to trek the park and have some fun

LOCAL PLANT PROFILE

NATIVE HOPBUSH OR **BEAD HOPBUSH**

Marrkiya (Goldfields Aboriginal Name)

A lovely scented bush, which releases its fragrance after rain and mixes with the scent of Eucalyptus - a wonderful Goldfields experience.

Size and form: a multibranched, upright shrub to 2m high, generally 1 – 1.5

Flowers: Inconspicuous, however the striking red fruits are often thought to

Fruits: Lobed or winged fruits which look like butter flies and are generally red but vary in colour from green to peach and red to

house small, black seeds. Leaves: Narrow leaves with small, well rounded lobes along the edge. Leaves are often sticky

Habitat: A common plant throughout the Goldfields; grows in shallow red soils and sandy loams, on rocky slopes, ridges and hillsides. Use: For aromatic oils and pot pourii, for medicinal purposes and a striking

Interesting Facts: Is so named because of the similarity of its winged fruit to those of true hops used in brewing. It has a lovely aroma, smelling a bit like cinnamon or mixed spice. It feels sticky when ouched almost as if it had been sprayed with something, hence it is also known as Sticky Hopbush.

WATER: THE LIFEBLOOD OF BIRDS, BEES AND ANIMALS

As spring rolls on into summer the pressure on birds and bees to source water increases. Here are some simple things you can provide in your garden to allow birds and bees (and the occasional furry visitor) to find water and survive the searing heat of a Goldfields Summer.

We all know the value of providing a water supply in our gardens

over summer, but with a few simple tweak's you can turn a bird bath or

dish into a safe bee watering station.

Good bird baths are shallow and allow the birds to bath without danger of drowning. Bees also need provisions to allow them to safely access water. In your bird bath or dish place rocks or pebbles into the

bottom to raise the floor of the container. This allows the bees to drink without falling into deeper water. They are after all, tiny little critters, and we need to make it more manageable for them to access. If dishes of water are placed at ground level you might find that animals will also source water in your yard. Remember to keep dishes cleaned and topped up with fresh water.

Huegelkulture


What is it, and can its principles be applied to the Goldfields?

By definition (Thanks Wikipedia), Huegelkultur is a German originating horticultural method where compostable plant materials and decaying wood debris is mounded up to be used as a raised planting bed.

It is said to improve the fertility of the soil, retain moisture and as compounds decompose. produces warmth.

The same concept has been trialled in preexisting raised garden beds by exchanging rubble and poor fill in the bottom of the garden bed with logs, branches, wood chips, leaves etc and filling the rest of the raised bed with soil and compost.

The inclusion of organic material decreases the need for watering as moisture is retained by



the organic lower layers. Huegelkultur in its concept tries to replicate

the natural process of decomposition that happens in woods and forests.

The decomposition of the organic materials also feed soil microbes needed for healthy plants and high levels of carbon and nitrogen produced feeds new growth.

Hugelkultur is ideal for nutrient hungry annual crops and therefore a great way of setting up your new Veggie Patch or Herb Garden.

There is a great example of a Huegelkultur mound at the Community Garden next to Hammond Park.
